	SAGA Medical Assistance	These programs provide medical assistance to low-income persons who do not qualify for, or who are awaiting an eligibility determination, for other state or federal programs. The program operates under regulations of the Department of Social Services. The State-Administered General Assistance (SAGA) program covers almost all services covered under the Connecticut Medicaid program with the exception of long-term care and non-emergency medical transportation. 	Connecticut Insurance Assistance Program for AIDS Patients (CIAPAP)	This program pays for drugs determined by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to prolong the life of people with AIDS, or HIV infection. To be eligible for the program in Connecticut, an individual must have a physician certification that the individual has HIV infection, HIV disease or AIDS, must not be a recipient of Medicaid, and must have net countable income within 400% of the Federal Poverty Level. 	Refugee Medical Assistance:	The refugee medical assistance program provides medical assistance to needy individuals, families and children designated as refugees under Immigration and Naturalization Service regulations who are not eligible to receive benefits from any other public assistance program. Benefits continue for a maximum of eight months beginning with the month of entry into the United States. Benefits are the same as in the Medicaid program, and are 100% federally funded.		
Delaware	Delaware Healthy Children Program	The Delaware Healthy Children Program covers everything from routine checkups to eye exams to doctor and hospital services. 	Delaware Prescription Assistance Program (DPAP)	The Delaware Prescription Assistance Program (DPAP) began January 14, 2000 as a result of the passage of Senate Bill 6 during the 1999 legislative session. This program is funded through tobacco settlement funds, and provides up to \$2500 per individual in each calendar year for eligible clients. New York	Family Health Plus	Family Health Plus is a public health insurance program for adults who are aged 19 to 64 who do not have health insurance - either on their own or through their employers - but have income or resources too high to qualify for Medicaid. Family Health Plus is available to single adults, couples without children, and parents with limited income who are residents of New York State and are United States citizens or fall under one of many immigration categories. Family Health Plus provides comprehensive coverage, including prevention, primary care, hospitalization, prescriptions and other services.
